Direct Admission into the Ph.D. Program

The Mechanical Engineering Department offers direct admission into its doctoral program for outstanding students with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering. This special "fast-track" program allows a student to apply up to 18 credit hours from the coursework hours requirement to the dissertation hours requirement, while retaining the 78 credit hours required past the Bachelor's degree. The minimum number of dissertation hours remains at 24 credit hours. A student admitted into this "fast-track" program must successfully complete a minimum of 36 credit hours of coursework and a minimum of 24 credit hours of dissertation with the total coursework and dissertation hours reaching a minimum of 78 credit hours. The expected program of study for most students in this track is 36 credit hours of coursework and 42 credit hours of dissertation. A minimum of 36 credit hours of the coursework must be from regularly scheduled, graduate-level courses, and cannot be one-on-one, directed study type courses. Additionally, students must satisfy the core course requirement for the Ph.D. degree.

Admission Requirements

This fast-track program is open only to outstanding students who have demonstrated excellence in their undergraduate (UG) career and who are well prepared to excel in their graduate coursework and research. Therefore, admission into this program shall be considered on an exceptional basis.

To be considered for admission to this program, applicants must meet the following minimum requirements:

- 1. An undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering from a reputable program,
- 2. An UG GPA of 3.5 or higher,
- 3. A GRE quantitative score of 85% or higher,
- 4. Strong letters of recommendation supporting the student's direct admission into a fast-track program, and
- 5. A written statement of purpose that projects maturity, purpose, commitment, and a

Degree Requirements

Spring 2020 Graduate and Professional Programs Academic Records and Enrollment Policies Changes

The following policies were adopted for Spring 2020 to provide a grading option for students enrolled in graduate courses in consideration of the change in teaching modality as well as other unusual personal and educational circumstances due to the COVID-19 outbreak in Spring 2020.

The policies were approved by the faculty and Deans of the respective graduate and professional programs and accepted by the Provost.

The policies apply to graduate-level coursework attempted in the Spring 2020 academic term. A policy may be renewed by a program for subsequent terms that are affected by circumstances related to COVID-19 upon the recommendation of the appropriate Dean and approval of the Provost.

GRADUATE COURSE GRADING POLICY & OPTIONS FOR SPRING SEMESTER 2020

This policy provides students in all graduate-level courses an option for a grade of Pass ("P").

Faculty will report letter grades as normal according to the grading system used for each course and described in the course syllabus.

A student may choose to keep the letter grade for each course or request a change to a grade of Pass.

- o The selection must be made to the Cox Graduate Student Services Office no later than 5:00 p.m. (CDT), Wednesday, May 13, 2020.
- A student may make this selection course-by-course after the letter grade is posted in my.SMU at the end of the term. If no selection is made, the grade assigned will be the standard letter grade.
- This grade policy applies to courses offered in Spring 2020, Module B and courses that span both Modules A and B.
- o Spring 2020, Module A courses are not eligible for this grade policy.

A grade of Pass is eligible in the case of letter grades of C- or above. Letter grades of D+ or

A student who wishes to select a Pass (P) must communicate that intention in writing to the Meadows Academic Records Offices no later than 5:00pm (CDT), Wednesday, May 13, 2020. An email message to the Meadows Graduate Academic Records Coordinator, Jennifer Smith (smithjr@smu.edu,) is an acceptable means of delivering this information.

Please note that Meadows graduate programs have different thresholds for a grade to be considered passing. For example, in the Division of Theatre, B is the minimum passing grade. In the Division of Music, C is the minimum passing grade.

The optional grade of Pass (P) can only be selected if a student meets the threshold for passing in the academic unit which offers the course.

Letter grades below the academic unit's threshold for passing are not eligible for this option and will remain as recorded by the instructor of record.

Notes re Pass (P)

This policy is only for graduate-level Meadows courses in which the student earns a grade at or above the threshold for passing in the academic unit in which the course is offered.

A grade of P conveys credit for the course, but does not carry grade points and, therefore, does not affect the GPA.

A grade of P will satisfy pre-requisite, major/minor requirements.

A grade of P will satisfy grade replacement for repeated core and required courses.

This policy is in effect for the Spring semester of 2020 and will be reviewed as needed for possible extension.

Perkins School of Theology

Due to the unprecedented circumstances related to the spread of the Covid-19 virus, Perkins School of Theology will permit students to request a grade of <u>Credit</u> or <u>No Credit</u> in any course this semester for which they are now registered that currently requires a "performance grade" (that is, a letter grade of A to F).* Nothing will change for those who do not make this request. (In other words, they will still receive a letter grade.) Students wishing to take this option must complete the online form (<u>linked here</u>) for each course. **All requests must be submitted by 5:00 p.m. Central Daylight Time on Monday, April 6, 2020.**

Please note the following consequences of choosing this option:

Students who receive a final grade of D- or better will receive a final grade of CR (Credit). A grade of CR has no impact on GPA (Grade Point Average). Students who receive a final grade of F would instead receive a final grade of NC (No Credit), which also has no impact on GPA. A student receiving a grade of NC in a required course will be required to repeat the course. A student receiving a grade of NC in an elective course can take anothertive catuden

The grade of "I" will remain until a student clears the incomplete with the faculty member or until the student graduates, whichever comes first.

At the point of graduation, any grade of "I" for a course taken in Spring 2020 will convert to "NC" for no credit. "NC" does not impact the GPA nor does it satisfy graduation, pre-requisite, major/minor or general education requirements because it does not convey credit for the course.

Students cannot change a grade of "I" to a grade of "S," "S-," or "NC" during the window listed above after grades are posted.

Once the replacement grade is posted the student will have 48 hours to change the grade to a grade of "S," "S-," or "NC."

Transcript Notation

In addition to this grading option, a notation will appear on all transcripts for the Spring 2020 term highlighting the unusual educational circumstances due to a global health crisis.

The operational implementation of this temporary policy is a work-in-progress. We ask for patience and understanding as the Registrar's Office develops the most efficient method to allow students to make this selection. Instructions will be available by April 30, 2020.
